Changing Seasons

Although the weather seems to be the biggest conversation topic right now, the Church seasons are changing, too. The season of Epiphany is celebrated more in some parts of the country and world than in others — think of the days leading up to Mardi Gras, which will be March 4 this year — but it is generally a



happy season which commemorates Christ’s revelation to the Gentiles. On Ash Wednesday the Church begins to prepare spiritually for the eventual



Passion and Crucifixion. Lent is a season of soul-searching, penitence, and self-discipline, not celebration. No matter how gently we may treat ourselves, a serious mood prevails, contrasting not only with the end of Epiphany, but more importantly and forcefully with the future joy and jubilation of Easter.

And Changing Times

As a practical rather than spiritual matter, remember that Sunday, March 9, is the day to “spring ahead” and set your clocks an hour later for Daylight Saving Time. We lose that extra hour of sleep we gained in the fall. Don’t miss church!



An Interesting View of Charity

One of the most widely referred to sections of the Jewish *Mishneh Torah* is the section dealing with [Tzedakah](#) (Charity). In *Hilkhot Matanot Aniyim* (Laws about Giving to Poor People), Chapter 10:7–14, Maimonides, a famous 12th-century Spanish physician and Jewish scholar, lists his famous Eight Levels of Giving (where the first level is most preferable, and the eighth the least):^[50]

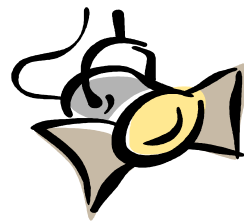
1. Giving an interest-free loan to a person in need; forming a partnership with a person in need; giving a grant to a person in need; finding a job for a person in need; so long as that loan, grant, partnership, or job results in the person no longer living by relying upon others.
2. Giving tzedakah anonymously to an unknown recipient via a person (or public fund) which is trustworthy, wise, and can perform acts of tzedakah with your money in a most impeccable fashion.
3. Giving tzedakah anonymously to a known recipient.
4. Giving tzedakah publicly to an unknown recipient.
5. Giving tzedakah before being asked.
6. Giving adequately after being asked.
7. Giving willingly, but inadequately.
8. Giving "in sadness" (giving out of pity): It is thought that Maimonides was referring to giving because of the sad feelings one might have in seeing people in need (as opposed to giving

because it is a religious obligation). Other translations say "Giving unwillingly."

Our First Sunday offerings all seem to relate in some way to one or more of the first four ways of giving. Certainly Episcopal Relief and Development is a fund with an impeccable reputation which, in addition to providing emergency disaster relief, strives to give to people in ways that allow them to begin living without having to rely on others. The Child Care centers of the Diocese of Botswana and Our Little Roses home also work to provide education to children and young girls which will help them to become self-sufficient. All of our other recipients also fit in some way at least one of those first four.

Assuming that the second suggested translation of number 8 is the correct one, as seems most reasonable, it is the only one to avoid, and surely we never give our offerings unwillingly.
